You are making the impossible possible!

With every swallow of alcohol Mindy felt herself growing numb to the pain. It had become her nightly routine to escape from the nightmares on repeat from her past. Numbness felt better than feeling, and she was determined to stay numb.

Even the love Mindy felt for her children scared her because she knew it could all disappear in a second. She learned that early in life. People were not to be trusted. They use you and disappear. Family was there until the money ran out. Mindy was so afraid to feel anything, frightened that she would return to her past. Numbness was the only way to quiet her fears.

Then one day, Mindy woke up and couldn't remember what happened or where she was. She soon realized that she was in jail. People told her stories of what happened, but it was all so fuzzy. Fear gripped her body and she started shaking. HER CHILDREN. Where were her children? All the memories she tried so hard to repress came back to her, and she became violently ill. Were they in foster care now too? Would they be forced to sell themselves like she did to keep a roof over their heads?

Mindy was terrified and didn't know what to do. She begged to see a lawyer and soon the story of her past came out; a story that trapped her in shame for years. Mindy was convinced that something terrible would happen if anyone found out. It was beaten into her repeatedly that she could tell no one, so she buried it deep inside her scarred soul, unable to acknowledge it even to herself.

Until now.

Mindy slowly shared with her attorney what happened in her foster home. And that she had never talked about the trafficking and trauma that still haunted her. Her fears for her children. Her desire to get help. Mindy's lawyer listened intently, and then told her about Freekind.

Once she connected with Freekind, the case manager worked with the courts to get her accepted to a treatment program where she could participate in trauma therapy. Mindy was able to find a safe placement for her children which allowed her to focus on healing. Instead of using drugs and alcohol to numb the pain, Mindy realized that working through her trauma would give her the relief she so desired. It was less about being numb and more about being free.

Mindy found a community of support she had never before experienced. She no longer felt alone and isolated by her trafficking experience. She now knows healing is possible.

Resilience. That was our "word of the year" in 2023. We went through an organizational restructure to better position us to meet the increasing demand for our services. We onboarded new team members and crafted our new 3-year strategic plan. We also took a few intentional pauses to invest in trauma and resiliency tools, because the work we do is heavy. Beyond the mental toll of the subject matter itself and the emotional toll of the stories we hear from clients, the challenges of being a community nonprofit with no state or federal funding can be daunting. Yet we press on, because of supporters like you, who continue to invest in our mission.


And because survivors like "Sky" graduate from college and regain custody of their children. Because students like Marcus decide not to become part of the "family business," as a result of our prevention program. And because our community needs us to continue educating, equipping and empowering them to understand what trafficking looks like right here in Virginia. Together, we can make our Commonwealth the safest place for our children to grow up and for survivors to heal. And we can be the last community where a trafficker even considers selling people for profit.



Since its inception, the Prevention Project program has equipped 1,500 classrooms, empowered more than 55,000 students and reached youth across 21 states through the 2022-23 school year! These students are now educated on the realities of human trafficking, equipped to understand the signs, and empowered to keep themselves and their friends safe! Prevention is a powerful tool that not only equips youth to avoid predators and recognize unhealthy relationships, but it also disrupts would-be buvers and would-be traffickers, like Marcus. Marcus came from a family where "pimping" was the family business, and it was normalized. According to his teacher, Marcus went from being resistant to the program to becoming the biggest driving force in his class to stop trafficking.

Prevention efforts continued in 2023 with the creation of a new edition of the program designed specifically for youth in the juvenile justice system, who are at increased risk compared to their peers. We are currently preparing to pilot the new edition, with the goal of making it available across the Commonwealth of Virginia by the end of 2024. We also continued our partnerships with local colleges and universities in 2023 to raise awareness and equip young adults, faculty and leadership on the unique vulnerabilities of this age group and how to better protect our college campuses from traffickers.

Youth and young adults are uniquely vulnerable to exploitation. That's why the Prevention Project program exists, and why we are working to fill gaps in education that will help prevent the next generation from being trafficked.

And we serve people with complex trauma, who deserve our best, so that they have a reason to believe in themselves and in their future. That they have value and purpose. That they are loved and not alone.

As you read through these pages, we hope you will both celebrate and mourn the story they tell. It is one of survivors choosing freedom and others who didn't make it. It is about financial partners who could not look away, and school systems who declared "not on my watch." And it's the story of individuals like you, who made the impossible possible.

Our Vision for Awareness Education

American author Flannery O'Connor once said, "The truth does not change according to our ability to stomach it emotionally." At the heart of our awareness education efforts is creating a gnawing revelation of the truth about exploitation and victimization of people right here in our community. It is only when people have knowledge of a situation that action can lead to change that can transform individual lives, families and communities.

To that end, our awareness education is focused on those who have the greatest likelihood of acting as agents of change and/or can provide healing for victims of human trafficking. This past year, Freekind conducted a host of industry-specific trainings to equip and empower members of the criminal justice continuum, faith communities, foster care agencies, college staff and students, business leaders and other non-profits.

Ignorance allows human trafficking to flourish. And if we turn our heads, shut our eyes and close our ears, it will remain in the dark, but it will be there nonetheless. Education casts a light in the darkness, bringing trafficking out of the shadows. Once we know what it really looks like, we can take action. But it will take all of us. Together, we can make Virginia the least friendly place for traffickers and a refuge of healing for survivors.

Since we began our Survivor Advocacy program in 2014, we have been able to equip lay people in our community to empower the survivors we serve. The heart of our advocacy program is to foster a culture of presence- continuing to show up for survivors as they navigate life after exploitation. Many of them have never had stable relationships, so we can truly see the difference it makes for people who have been through trauma to know that someone is there for them. And that one wrong decision or mistake does not end their relationship with us. We will continue to train advocates because the need is great. 


