Aliya was homeless and jobless, just trying to maintain her sobriety when she reached out to Freekind. She shared her incredible story of courage and survival and recounted times she was forced to go without basic needs for days, being confined to a small motel room, working 18+ hours a day with no sleep, and how she endured unbelievable mental, physical, and sexual abuse at the hands of her traffickers.

With assistance from Freekind, she received supportive services to include help finding employment opportunities. Aliya began a full-time job with benefits and quickly demonstrated to her employers how motivated and determined she was to succeed, earning her a promotion.

Offramps Program

Our Offramps program assists adult victims of human trafficking right here in our community, especially those who have been criminalized. Our goal is to minimize revictimization and reincarceration by giving survivors and the criminal justice system alternatives. For survivors, that includes practical support to escape their trafficker and forge a new life, free of abuse. For criminal justice professionals, that means advocating for alternative sentencing, so that survivors can participate in restorative care rather than incarceration for crimes initiated by their traffickers.

In the summer of 2014, Freekind conducted its first Volunteer Survivor Advocacy Training. Since that time, we have equipped thirteen classes of survivor advocates to restore a sense of belonging to survivors of sex trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation. Our trained advocates serve survivors by teaching classes in the jail, meeting short-term needs, and walking alongside survivors for long-term support.

Then, in 2016, we held our first class on human trafficking for women incarcerated at Hampton Roads Regional Jail. We had 14 women in attendance. From there our Offramps program was born. Since that time, nearly 400 women across five local jails have participated in our program.










But what if Aliya had attended a school where prevention education had been available? Could she have escaped her victimization? 15-year-old Aliya squirmed in her seat when the information her teacher shared hit too close to home. She met her boyfriend online in a gaming chat room and he made her feel so beautiful with his compliments and attention. The gaming world was her way of escaping her volatile home life. She never expected to find someone who cared about her there. He had asked her to run away from home and come live with him so they could work on their dream of being together forever.

She could finally see a way out. But her stomach began to flip as each sign of grooming was shared, and it was as if the teacher was mapping out her entire relationship with her new boyfriend. The seed of doubt had been sown by her teacher, and there was no escaping it.

PREVENTION PROJECT_®

During the 2021-2022 school year, you equipped 413 classrooms, empowered 11,844 students, and reached 3 new states with the life-saving tools of the Prevention Project.



Unfortunately, Aliya didn't have access to prevention education and we f ind her seated in the back of the squad car, the handcuffs pinching and rubbing her wrists in painful, all too familiar ways. The dread begins to pulse through her as she contemplates the beating that is coming her way when she gets back to her boyfriend who she calls "daddy." Her anxious thoughts are interrupted when the arresting officer turns to face her and asks, "What happened to you? How can I help?" For a moment, she sits in stunned silence unable to process the question. It was one she had never been asked before. For the first time since she had been in "the life" she didn't feel judged for her choices. It felt like a lifeline was being thrown to her.

What if, instead of suffering countless years of abuse and exploitation, a well-trained officer, prosecutor, or probation officer intervened, and her time in "the life" was reduced to days or weeks? Unfortunately, Aliya didn't have criminal justice professional result in a life of freedom for Aliya and hundreds more like her? How might a trauma-trained criminal justice professional result in a life of freedom for Aliya and hundreds more like her?

Together we are making an

Freekind began in 2012 to bring awareness of human trafficking to Hampton Roads. Since then, our mission has expanded to include training and equipping criminal justice and other community professionals to reduce harm to victims by accelerating identification and intervention.

This includes members of the medical and social services professions, criminal justice providers, and crisis pregnancy centers. The longer a victim remains ensnared by their trafficker, the greater the trauma and shame, and the longer the road to recovery. By providing awareness training, we hope to increase early identification and improve the chances of recovery and restoration.

We also equip our community by engaging churches, civic organizations, and local businesses through awareness education. While the phrase "human trafficking" has become ubiquitous, many in our community still believe it is a problem that happens to "other" people or in other countries. We believe that the more people who understand what human trafficking looks like in our country and our communities, the greater our collective power to disrupt this \$150 billion criminal industry.






Meichell Worthing

The momentum of this year makes me excited for what's ahead in 2023, and I'd like to invite you to be part of it! This past October, Freekind launched its Richmond Advisory Council, a diverse, 9-member group of leaders representing both the public and private sector in the greater Richmond community. With the help of this team, we are building new relationships and gaining a clear understanding of the current services, organizations and initiatives available to survivors or human trafficking, and how Freekind can add value through its unique service model. And as the birthplace of the Prevention ProjectTM program, Richmond will be a priority for our continued efforts to invite more schools and community organizations to partner with us in preventing the next generation from being trafficked.

Our goal is to introduce Freekind to the broader Richmond community, even as we strengthen existing relationships with churches, businesses, volunteers and donors in both the Hampton Roads and Richmond communities. We will continue working on new editions of the Prevention Project curriculum, shoring up gaps for at-risk populations. We also will continue expanding our Offramps program in both regions, allowing continues identification of survivors caught in the criminal legal system rather than recognized as victims in need of restorative care. In addition, we will be seeking an independent research partner to assess the long-term effectiveness of our survivor services, helping to strengthen the program and potentially equip other communities to replicate our program to support survivors in more communities.
